The Collect

Readings

Hebrews 2: 14-end

The writer describes the work of Jesus in terms of High-Priestly sacrifice.

Since, therefore, the children share flesh and blood, he himself likewise shared the same things, so that through death he might destroy the one who has the power of death, that is, the devil, and free those who all their lives were held in slavery by the fear of death. For it is clear that he did not come to help angels, but the descendants of Abraham. Therefore he had to become like his brothers and sisters in every respect, so that he might be a merciful and faithful high priest in the service of God, to make a sacrifice of atonement for the sins of the people. Because he himself was tested by

what he suffered, he is able to help those who are being tested.

This is the word of the Lord. Thanks be to God.

Luke 2: 22-40

Jesus, six weeks old, taken to the Temple, is recognised as the one who will bring salvation to Jews and Gentiles.

When the time came for their purification according to the law of Moses, they brought him up to Jerusalem to present him to the Lord (as it is written in the law of the Lord, 'Every firstborn male shall be designated as holy to the Lord'), and they offered a sacrifice according to what is stated in the law of the Lord, 'a pair of turtle-doves or two young pigeons.'

Now there was a man in Jerusalem whose name was Simeon; this man was righteous and devout, looking forward to the consolation of Israel, and the Holy Spirit rested on him. It had been revealed to him by the Holy Spirit that he would not see death before he had seen the Lord's Messiah. Guided by the Spirit, Simeon came into the temple; and when the parents brought in the child Jesus, to do for him what was customary under the law, Simeon took him in his arms and praised God, saying,

'Master, now you are dismissing your servant in peace,

according to your word; for my eyes have seen your salvation, which you have prepared in the presence of all peoples,

a light for revelation to the Gentiles and for glory to your people Israel.'

And the child's father and mother were amazed at what was being said about him. Then Simeon blessed them and said to his mother Mary, 'This child is destined for the falling and the rising of many in Israel, and to be a sign that will be opposed so that the inner thoughts of many will be revealed—and a sword will pierce your own soul too.'

There was also a prophet, Anna the daughter of Phanuel, of the tribe of Asher. She was of a great age, having lived with her husband for seven years after her marriage, then as a widow to the age of eighty-four. She never left the temple but worshipped there with fasting and prayer night and day. At that moment she came, and began to praise God and to speak about the child to all who were looking for the redemption of Jerusalem.

When they had finished everything required by the law of the Lord, they returned to Galilee, to their own town of Nazareth. The child grew and became strong, filled with wisdom; and the favour of God was upon him.

This is the Gospel of the Lord. **Praise to you, O Christ.**

A Reflection by Rev Peter Dockree

If you were playing football, and you scored a majestic goal (a reach for my imagination but maybe not for you), and then as soon as you scored people dug up the goal posts and moved them 50 metres and said your goal didn't count because the goal posts should have been in the new place, you would I suspect be pretty miffed. Or if you played a game but you didn't really know the rules and they seemed to keep changing, it is hard to stay motivated and positive.

That is the reality of life for so many of us right now. We want to stay hopeful but timeframes, promised solutions all seem to be movable things.

In the midst of the movable, we I suggest need a hope that reflects the situation we find ourselves in, one that relates to where we are. Anna and Simeon had been holding out hope. Hope of the one who would come. But over many centuries that hope had been held, but no one knew where the goalposts stood. They had the promises of the prophets, but no clear timeframes, very few certainties. People tried to pin down the prophecies to events, as they have done since, but to no avail. In the midst of this came the baby Jesus. Anna and Simeon were able to recognise lesus in the midst of so much uncertainty. Jesus who would become the one who would suffer, spoken of in our Hebrews reading.

The emergence of the one who would suffer, the one who had been promised, doesn't

suddenly nail down the goalposts. It doesn't bring all the answers. Jesus's arrival posed as many questions as it brought answers to those first century lews. We know too well how the disciples, who came to know him best, fumbled as they tried to work out what was happening. The goal posts must have constantly felt like they were moving for those early followers. They gave up everything, followed him, but he seemed to always be calling them further, and then things took a turn none of them could predict in his arrest and crucifixion. Sometimes in his parables Jesus seemed to sew more confusion not less. And yet it is the presence of the one who was promised, God's son in the midst of the storms of life, that brought a hope that had the ability to hold true in the midst of all the moving pieces. A hope that released Simeon and Ann, a hope that held the disciples as there worlds fell apart and were rebuilt again. A hope that can hold us in the ever changing scenes of life.

We follow a God who is fully connected to the realities of life on earth, and whatever goal posts seem to be moving for you right now, I pray that you may find a hope that holds you in the midst of the storm.

We pray for all who find life difficult at the moment because of economic hardship, or illness, or uncertainty about the future, and for all who are suffering from the effects of the Corona virus. We thank you, and pray for all who work in or alongside the NHS, for scientists developing vaccines and all managing their delivery. We pray for all who will find it hard to obtain the vaccines in less well-developed parts of the world.
