Readings

Proverbs 8: 1, 22-31

A description of Wisdom, one of the attributes of God's nature.

Does not wisdom call, and does not understanding raise her voice?

The Lord created me at the beginning of his work, the first of his acts of long ago.

Ages ago I was set up, at the first, before the beginning of the earth. When there were no depths I was brought forth, when there were no springs abounding with water.

Before the mountains had been shaped, before the hills, I was brought forth—when he had not yet made earth and fields, or the world's first bits of soil.

When he established the heavens, I was there, when he drew a circle on the face of the deep, when he made firm the skies above.

when he established the fountains of the deep, when he assigned to the sea its limit,

Colossians I: 15-20

John 1: 1-14

lesus is God's Word for us.

In the beginning was the Word, and the Word was with God, and the Word was God. He was in the beginning with God. All things came into being through him, and without him not one thing came into being. What has come into being in him was life, and the life was the light of all people. The light shines in the darkness, and the darkness did not overcome it.

There was a man sent from God, whose name was John. He came as a witness to testify to the light, so that all might believe through him. He himself was not the light, but he came to testify to the light. The true light, which enlightens everyone, was coming into the world.

He was in the world, and the world came into being through him; yet the world did not know him. He came to what was his own, and his own people did not accept him. But to all who received him, who believed in his name, he gave power to become children of God, who were born, not of blood or of the will of the flesh or of the will of man, but of God.

And the Word became flesh and lived among us, and we have seen his glory, the glory as of a father's only son, full of grace and truth.

This is the Gospel of the Lord. **Praise to you, O Christ.**

A Reflection by Rev Canon Bruce Hartnell

Travel agents, not surprisingly, want to remind us of flights to sun-blessed shores we perhaps took in the past and might take again with their help. This year, next year, sometime – if possible! Most years, the gloomy early months are brightened by brochures with promises of brilliant sun, sand and Sangria. Whether we ever did take them up on their tempting promises or not, it seems a depressing fact that our borders are closed in almost every direction for the weeks ahead.

Paul, in this morning's sensational letter to Christians in Colossae, is engaged on an advertising campaign of a similar boldness. He is appealing to the Colossians' experience of being whisked from one deeply depressing reality to another country – even, another world which enjoys a radically different climate. It is an appeal he has no hesitation in making. 'God rescued us from dead-end alleys and dark dungeons,' as Eugene Peterson puts it in his

modern version of Paul's Greek. 'He's set us up in the kingdom of the Son he loves so much, the Son who got us out of the pit we were in.' So it is as if we and they (those Christian people so long back) are picked up from one kingdom, say the United Kingdom, and transferred to a kingdom so different that we feel we have been re-born, placed in a new creation entirely.

Only the One who is over all powers and dominions can transfer subjects from one kingdom to another. Only the One God who is God can do the work that only God can do. Therefore, the man Jesus, so recently dead and buried when Paul was writing and then raised and glorified, must have been part of the creating Will and Purpose from the very start.

This is not just theoretically true. In practice, Jesus reveals to us everything that is true about the character of God, meeting us in the flesh and inviting us to enter a new experience of intimacy with God as his beloved children. That surely is the compulsive drawing power of St John's opening chapter.

So along with people in Colossae and Ephesus then and with Indian and Vietnamese Christians today, we find the same thing when we receive Holy Communion. Then we too accept the work of Christ and experience its transforming power. And having been air-lifted into this new environment, we benefit from the type of prayers that Paul offers: prayers spilling over into thanksgiving, thanks for steady faith in Christ and for lines of purpose in lives that

never grow slack, kept taut by hope. Prayer for the strength to stick it out over the long haul – not the grim strength of gritting your teeth but the glory-strength that God gives.

As 21st century people ask with a confident grin, "What's not to like?"

Or in rather more traditional language: 'Amen, may it be so.'



Help us to be tuned to your voice as we seek to create and maintain community and relationships during this time.

problems overwhelming. Lord we pray especially that we wouldn't become fatigued or indifferent to what we see, hear and read about your world – instead we ask you would compel us to get on our knees and cry out to you for your mercy in our broken world.

Many of us will have heard someone tell us this week they've had their Covid vaccine – Lord we thank you for all the wisdom and knowledge



that has brought us to this point and for all those involved in every aspect of managing this pandemic, from frontline staff in hospitals to those behind the scenes keeping them clean, for those standing for hours administering vaccines to those printing the letters offering appointments.
